## Gardening

17 Members of the group visited E Smith's Nurseries on Tuesday, 17th March and Sarah and Derek Smith started our visit by explaining how Derek's father had bought two acres of land in the 60's and over the years was successful in producing plants and vegetables wholesale and selling them from a shop he had in Warrington. Keith joined his dad at 16 and, when he married Sarah, Keith converted the bungalow on site to a house and together they increased the acreage to five.

During Covid business died – so they set about delivering plants and compost to clients and this grew to being a very viable trade, with the weather being so good during lockdown. Most of their current business is to the general public.

Way back they invested in machinery to make the tasks of planting, picking out, watering, etc. much quicker and on an industrial scale. Unlike many garden centres, they move their seedlings, young plants and mature plants from warm to outside conditions slowly, which gives the plants more chance of successful growing in their customers' gardens.

We were all amazed at what the machines can do and the intricacies of working the different machines which can plant the seeds and pick out the seedlings. Plants with wider leaves need to be planted-on by hand but machinery forms a conveyer belt to make this process even quicker.



The above photos show the trays they use, which are in different gauges. These trays get filled with soil and then seeds are planted in them. Next, a machine picks out the seedlings, which when fully grown, are housed in the various greenhouses.

When customers visit Derek and Susan's nursery and buy plants, they have no idea of the workload involved behind the scenes and this visit gave us a rare insight which we all found amazing. Thanks to Sarah and Derek.

### Genealogy

The group met on the 17th March with 17 members in attendance. We kicked off with a presentation from Susan entitled 'Journey Through My Family Tree - The Cryers and the Thomsons'. Her journey started as a child with a visit to the grave of her great-grandmother, Florence Thomson, and, during her presentation, we were taken to the many places in England that Susan had visited when researching this part of her family. She managed to find the house where Florence's husband, Joshua, grew up and, during a pub visit, she found a picture, which most likely included her great-great grandfather, Abraham Cryer. Susan related many stories concerning her ancestors right back to one of her 3 times great-grandfathers, William Cryer. We thoroughly enjoyed these most entertaining and informative tales - thank you Susan.

During the rest of our meeting, members either continued to work on their own family trees or helped other members to progress theirs.

At the meeting of the Music Appreciation Group on 12<sup>th</sup> March, we were joined by students from the Manchester University Outreach Orchestra. It is always a joy to hear them perform, with some familiar faces and many new musicians. The programme featured the all-female Glowworms Jazz Ensemble who played jazz-influenced songs, including a lovely original piece written by a member of the group, entitled 'Telephone'. After the break 3<sup>rd</sup> year cellist Ed Houghton played the Allemande from Bach's



6<sup>th</sup> Suite and 'Juli-O', a contemporary piece by Mark Summer. Then Maddy Vaudin performed on the flute. The orchestra concluded with 'What a Wonderful World' and 'Proud Mary'. Special thanks to Mike Coates for his help in organising these always enjoyable concerts. The next meeting will be on 9th April when member Mike will give

an illustrated presentation Giacomo Puccini – the Opera Romantic telling the story of the great Italian operatic composer (1858–1924) who was widely regarded as the greatest and most successful proponent of Italian opera after the great Giuseppe Verdi. Mike's musical passion began as the 'treble with the high voice' at Queen Elizabeth Grammar School, Darlington. He learnt to play violin in his 60s, and ended up playing in Lowry Strings, Salford. Mike has been a tenor in Lymm & District Chorus for 15 years. His musical God: Beethoven.

### Philosophy

At the first of our two meetings in March, we tackled Aristotle's 'The Nichomachean Ethics' – a foundation stone of moral philosophy in the Western tradition. Based on his concept of the habitual practice of virtue leading to the goal of human flourishing, we examined what it might mean to lead a meaningful, 'good' life, and how rationality and practical wisdom combined in the development of moral character. A lively discussion ensued, with a good deal of questioning and reflection on particular examples of what this might mean for our everyday lives, and how Aristotle might guide our thinking and acting along the way.

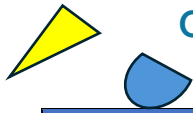
